Non-Fiction:

Fear Not Tomorrow, God is Already There by Ruth Graham – This book tackles the fear we face during times of change, uncertainty, and crisis, and reveals how to replace our fears with hope and anticipation. Filled with personal examples, Graham explores the concept of trust; and how we have no need to fear, but rather reason to hope. Each chapter ends with a beautiful Point of Focus, or scripture reference that fits the chapter. And at the end of the book is her ABC Praise List, a great reminder of who God is.

Jesus Revolution by Greg Laurie-Some might argue that the last major American Awakening took place in the late 1960's to mid-1970's in what was known as the Jesus Movement. Young men and women were coming to faith out of the hippie, drug culture. It was happening in locality after locality. Greg Laurie, in this book, offers a personal narrative of the times, the Southern California movement and Greg's conversion to Christ and growth as a young believer. Laurie narrates the times: the transition from the staid 1950's to the tumultuous 1960's, the rise of the civil rights and anti-war movements, the proliferation of drug use, the rock festivals, and how the promise of Woodstock rapidly unraveled, leaving the children of the counter-culture desperate for something better – Iesus Christ.

Embracing the Mysterious God by James White – Faith can sometimes be presented in a very rigid oversimplified way. This may lead any believer who experiences doubt, has difficult questions, or feels like God isn't near or isn't answering their prayers to believe they're the only one who feels that way. Dr. White takes a good hard look at these issues. He does so in a very nuanced and pastoral way. He doesn't belittle people for doubts or only say that you aren't feeling God or hearing from him because of sin. It's a book that demonstrates understanding regarding the struggles we have in our relationship with God, but also that those very struggles can be a natural part of developing a relationship with God.

Fiction:

Hidden Places by Lynn Austin - Lynn Austin is a

master of historical fiction. This novel has strong, complex everyday characters, a strong faith element, and a good plot line. The story will draw you in and make you feel like you are living right along side of the characters in their small town, rural setting. Join Aunt Batty, Eliza and Gabe as their past and present mesh - wrapping them all in the secure arms of a loving God

Almost Home by Valerie Fraser Luesse – It's the 1940s and Dolly Chandler is running a boarding house in her family home in Blackberry Springs, Alabama. Many people have flocked to the area to work at the plants producing military weapons and equipment. Some of the boarders have brought their painful pasts with them, but maybe staying with Dolly and her husband and getting to know the other people in the house, will help set them on the path to healing. And, of course, discovering a secret diary from the 1800s will provide an interesting mystery as well.

The Pink Bonnet by Liz Tolsma –The Pink Bonnet is based upon the true story of the Tennessee Children's Home Society and its nefarious adoption practices. Set in the time of The Depression, the story centers on a young widow Cecile and her three-year-old daughter Millie Mae. Struggling to support them, Cecile leaves Millie with a neighbour while she looks for full-time employment, but when she returns to pick Millie up, she is gone. Millie's been taken to the Tennessee Children's Home Society as some part of an adoption scam. When Cecile goes down to their office, she's told she's not a fit mother to raise her child, and that besides, she has already signed her rights away. Knowing this isn't true, Cecile swears to get Millie back from them, no matter what it takes.
